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### **AP CORNER**

### PETE MAGOUN, MMR

This hobby is a lot of fun, and as I've mentioned before, it's even more fun when you participate in a group setting of some sort. You learn from others, others learn from you, and everyone grows. As everyone grows, so, too, does your fun with the process and your friends. So now it's "Payback time," in the form of the last AP Category from which your MMR will require a certificate: **Service to the Hobby**. There are three possibilities here, all of which take time: **Association Official, Association Volunteer** and **Model Railroad Author**. Let's have a look at them in order of their appearance on the NMRA website.

First up is **Association Official.** Yup. You guessed it. You need to raise your hand and put some of those organizational skills you've been working on since you were in Scouts as a kid to work for the benefit of the NMRA. The Good News here is that you've been working on these skills since you were in Scouts as a kid, so you have a pretty good idea of what's involved. This is Corporate Governance of one form or another, and you have options.

To earn this certificate, you need to have completed satisfactory terms as President, Vice-President, Secretary, Treasurer or Director in one of the following, as listed on the NMRA website:

- At least one year in office at the national level.
- At least two years in the office(s) at the regional level, of which one shall be Region President or Trustee.
- At least three years in the office(s) at the regional level, if other than Region President or Trustee.
- Division Superintendents or Directors who serve as voting members of the Region Board of Directors, either by election, appointment, or automatic by-law provision, shall be eligible for the certificate on the same basis as any other Region Board member (i.e. three years of service required).

Note that there's also a lengthy discussion on what constitutes service toward "Official" as opposed to service toward "Volunteer." The short version here is that if your service makes you a voting member of a Region or National Board of Directors, then it counts for Official, otherwise it counts towards Volunteer. And this stuff can be divided up, so read the "fine print!" Five years as Division Superintendent and voting member of the Region Board, for instance, can be divided up for "Official" (three years) and Volunteer" two years, but you cannot count the same time for two different certificates.

With the requisite time logged in, fill out the SOQ, send it along, and bask in the joy of having done some Good for the Association, your friends and yourself.

But what if you haven't been any of the "honchos," for instance, but you've still done a lot for the organization over the years? This is where **Association Volunteer** comes into play. Here you need to accumulate sixty (60) "Time Units" on one or more NMRA National, Region or Division committees. The list of what counts, and for how much, is too lengthy to reprint here, so have a look on the NMRA website here: <a href="https://www.nmra.org/volunteer">https://www.nmra.org/volunteer</a> And do note that after item 6 on the list there is a lengthy discussion of what constitutes an "NMRA Committee." This is worth the read, and you may find that you've done a lot of the work already, especially if you've been involved in convention planning, contest judging or Division recruiting, for instance. Opening the Home Railroad to NMRA-sponsored "Layout Tours" generates time units on a schedule. This stuff adds up, and if you're involved, having a good time and helping the Division, Region or National organization do well, you've earned the Time Units.

And what of those of you who can, and do, write, photograph, and contribute? This is where **Model Railroad Author** joins the discussion. Once again, have a look at the website <a href="https://www.nmra.org/author">https://www.nmra.org/author</a>. The options abound! There

are lots of possibilities here, from videos to live clinics to print magazine articles, digital magazine articles and so on. Again, a lengthy list, with options, discussion, "fine print" explanations and the like, all of which are worth reading.

There are undoubtedly other ways in which you can render service to the hobby, as even the late-night "master class" in the bar over a libation is helping someone out, but the ones listed are the places that things "Count." All require an investment in time, and so I'll recommend a good read through the certificate requirements, and then start keeping logs!

We've now covered the basics of the AP here. I'm certainly open to questions, comments, interesting finds, tidbits, photos and so on from you as you work through the process. The AP will challenge you, will have you out of your comfort zone, will force you to confront some of your fears and trepidations, and will ultimately give you more skills and more fun in your hobby. It's a growth process, and it works pretty well.
